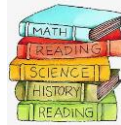
work, and to you as members for your generosity and patience.

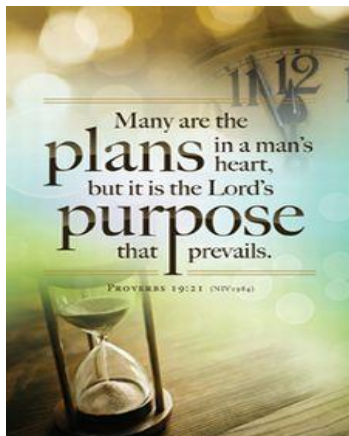
Although many of us look forward to taking a holiday during the summer months we will still be busy preparing

FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK:



As the 2019-2020 school year drew to close, it has definitely been a year for the history books. As I mentioned in other newsletters, it has been 100 years since the last time schools were closed for this length of time

(when the Spanish flu pandemic was spreading across the world). And at first glance it might seem the words of our theme text, "Come taste and see that the Lord is good," do not fit with these times. In a time when our plans have been upended, jobs have been lost, people have died, and uncertainty prevails how do we see God's goodness?

To help answer that question, some context is in order. Psalm 34 was written by David in uncertain times, when he as rightful king had to flee Israel in order to remain safe from Saul. He then found his life in danger once again as he stood before Abimelech the Philistine ruler. Only after pretending to be insane was he driven away from the court. Things

were not going well for David! During this time of trouble he wrote: "I sought the Lord, and he answered me; he delivered me from all my fears. Those who look to him are radiant; their faces are never covered with shame. This poor man called, and the Lord heard him; he saved him out of all his troubles. The angel of the Lord encamps around those who fear him, and he delivers them". Although David was in a very difficult situation, David took comfort knowing that God heard his prayers and would provide him with what he needed.

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The same holds true for us today. God hears our prayers and we know He works all things to our benefit (Lord's Day 10). The words of David still resonate and over the past few months at Harvest we could indeed "taste and see that the Lord is good." God has blessed us in many ways. We were blessed to be able to continue with our studies in the core subjects. We were blessed to be able to connect through technology. We were blessed to have our health. We were blessed to have the opportunity to spend more time with family. Students were blessed with the opportunities to explore areas of interest with the extra time on their hands. I know from talking to our students, some enjoyed extra time drawing, others working on mechanics, others on computer coding (in fact one student is designing a computer game!), others enjoyed time outdoors in God's creation, others building forts, others studying French (Rosetta Stone is free right now) and others reading and playing games. This list could go on and on! What is clear is many of our students are embracing different learning opportunities with the extra time they had this spring.

The most recent Reformed Perspective also highlighted some blessing that came about from our society being shut down:

- Iran has temporarily released a third of their Christian prisoners as a part of their plan to curb the spread of the virus.
- Roman Catholics have been told by the Pope that, if there are no

priests available, they can confess their sins directly to God.

- Google reports that the use of "prayer" as a search term has gone up dramatically.
- More than 5,600 Planned Parenthood clinics around the world have closed indefinitely, and abortifacients in many states have closed being deemed non-essential.

CARDUS (an education think tank that highlights the importance of independent schools) also highlighted some blessings that came about because of COVID-19. Here is an excerpt from their recent bulletin:

The COVID-19 pandemic - with its associated closure of schools, public spaces, and businesses - is placing tremendous pressure on families. Among all the challenges parents face, they've suddenly become responsible for all their children's education. But there's some good news among the challenge.

This week, we've seen the Ontario government announce the provision of \$200 per child (or \$250 per child with special needs) to assist families as they adapt to the new reality of educating their kids at home. We can't pretend that this money will solve all the difficulties associated with home-based education. But we can be thankful that this one-time assistance recognizes that the education of all Ontario's students - regardless of whether they

attended state-run or independently-run schools - is critical to the public interest [...] This week's announcement is a welcome recognition of that fact. It puts children and families first, recognizing that all are part of public education regardless of the type of school in which they're enrolled.

But of course, that is not to say that distance learning has been a wonderful experience for all. There have been challenges with motivation, there has been some frustration working from home. Some have been overwhelmed trying to juggle distance learning schedules. There has been anxiety and stress around the uncertainty of work, school, and what the future holds. And of course, we are all saddened by the loss of community and being able to see each other face to face.

God designed us to be relational beings, to be in community, and not being able to do just that has been tough. Technology is great but doesn't replace the in person face-to-face communication. As staff we have missed seeing the smiling faces of our students, hearing the laughter in the hallways, singing with our class in the classroom, playing with the students at recess and coming alongside our students to help them in their learning. We became teachers because we love being around students! We can't wait to see students back in the classroom next fall!

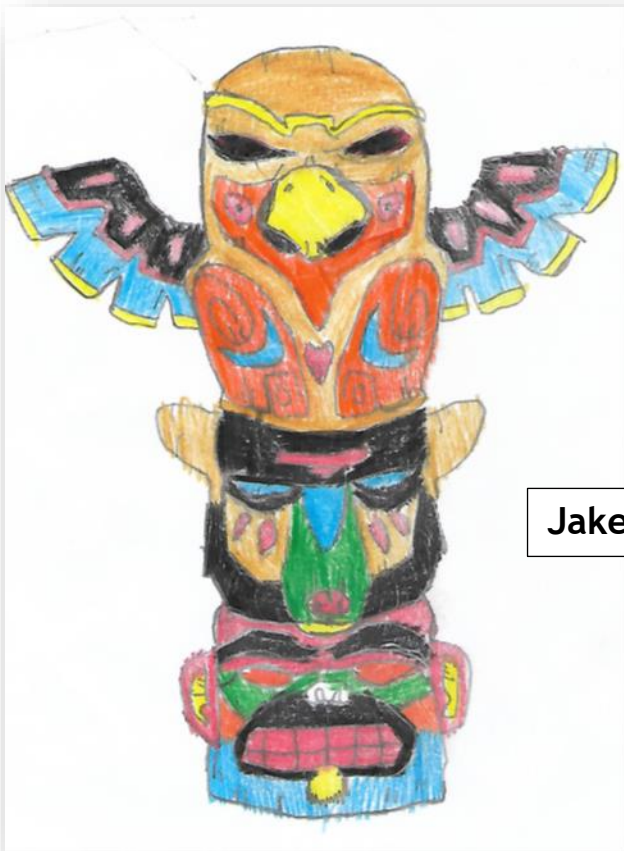
Symbolism in Grade 5/6

In one of our final church history units of the year, students learned about the first century Christian church and how they adopted a symbol to represent their faith. Any guesses what that symbol was? It was a fish. Perhaps the more difficult question, is why did they pick a fish to represent the Christian faith and not a more commonly used symbol for believers in the bible like a sheep?

To provide context to that answer, the early Christian church was driven underground to the labyrinth of catacombs under the city of Rome. It was in these soft rock passageways that many church services were held. To help provide direction to these secret worship services, fish were carved into the rock to indicate the direction go in these passageways. The authorities did not pick up on these symbols because they presumed these symbols were carved into the rock by mourners. They made this assumption because the ancient Greeks believed the fish or dolphin carried the deceased into the afterworld. Does it not appear ironic that this symbol of death was chosen by Christians?

But beyond the fish being a “red herring” to authorities, the fish of course is linked with Jesus. Jesus told the disciples “Come follow me, and I will make you fishers of men.” Several of Jesus’ miracles were with fish and the early church roasted fish in commemoration with Christ’s passion. So, the fish symbol makes sense.

To get students thinking about symbolism, grade 5/6 students were tasked with coming up with animals that symbolized them and to put these together in the form of a totem pole. Below are a few of these totem poles. Interestingly most student could accurately guess what animals would symbolize which classmate!

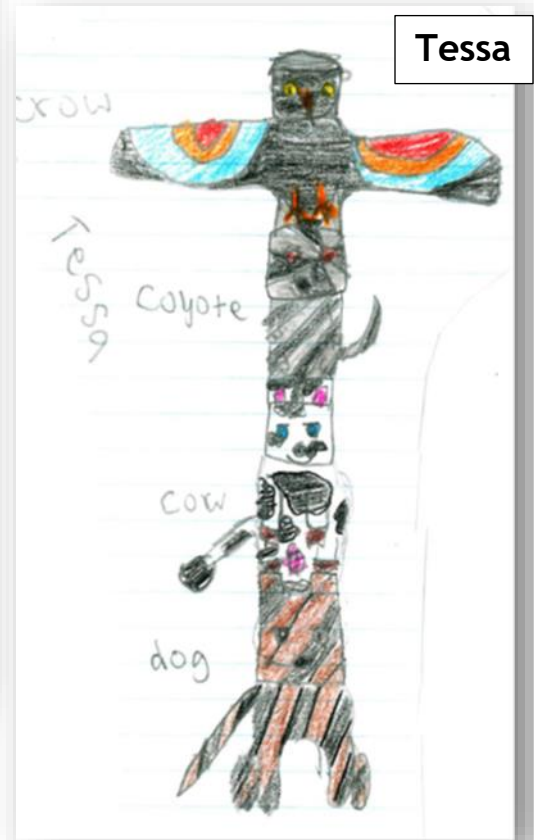
