# >>> From the Principal

Imagine life without words. This is a thought exercise I usually do with grade 5/6 at the beginning of the year. Imagine we lost our vocabulary. To illustrate how different life would be, I then ask the grade 5/6 students to achieve a task with their group, but no language is allowed. What follows is usually a pretty amusing class with students using a ton of body language and all the while generally not doing very well with their task. After we are done the task is it readily apparent to everyone how blessed we are that God has given us language and the opportunity to grow in our language skills here at school.

At our recent Compass Educators convention, Dr. Reuben Bredenhof began his keynote address with the exact same question -Imagine life without words. His address then unpacked how critically important language is and what follows are my efforts to capture some of that speech. Words matter. Literacy matters. Arguably language matters the most to us as Christians. We are people of the book, a book that highlights how much words matter. In Genesis 1 we meet our God who is a speaking God. In John 1, we read in the beginning was the Word [...] and the Word became flesh. A little later in the New Testament, in Colossians, we read that Christ is the Lord of language. And it is through language, through words, that God reveals Himself to us in the Bible. When reading God's Word we are exposed to a diverse book which includes proverbs, laws, parables, epistles, prophecies, oratories, apocalypse etc.

In that Word we also see that Jesus was creative with language. He knew how to ask an effective rhetorical question — what does it profit a man to gain the world and lose his soul? He also told captivating stories — think of his many parables. He knew what exact words to use to provide encouragements, and what words to use to make bold claims. Jesus knows

how to use language, because he designed it. The structure of language is not accidental.

As people of the book then, we should place a premium on literacy. But we find ourselves in a society where literacy is on the decline. 25% of Americans have not read a single book or part of a book in the last year. Is that the same in the church? Are people reading books? Culture has been called alliterate (we are not illiterate; we just choose not to read). Media pulls us in to fast paced information sharing. A culture formally dominated by words, is now dominated by images which have had a big impact on schools, homes, churches. The question we should ask ourselves is: How has the movement from languagebased media to picture-based media changed us? Many books have been published that discuss how the internet is changing our thinking. "The linear mind is being pushed aside by a new kind of mind that wants and needs to take in and dole out information in short, disjointed, often overlapping bursts - the faster the better" (Nicholas Carr). Carr goes on to state: What the net is doing is chipping away at my capacity of focusing. Once I was a scuba diver in a sea of words, now I zip along the surface like a person on a jet ski. As I skip along the surface, I lose the ability to take time to really explore and learn about the world around me. The consequence of this shift is that not only have our attention spans shortened, but our vocabularies are also shrinking. Instead of finding the best words to capture how I'm feeling, I can now find an emoji for that. This shift from words to images, makes reading the Bible daunting for many today. The Bible is thick and imposing, with no pictures and lots and lots of words. If we don't like reading, the Bible is a tough assignment. So, we skim the scriptures, read what we know, skip the rest, leaving out vast portions of scripture. We are jet skiing on the Bible's surface. But we are called to read the whole Bible, to pay close attention to details, to take a deep dive in our reading. Reading the Bible is critical in knowing God. We need to read carefully, responsibly, wisely. We need to patiently read and reflect on that reading. We need to engage with Scripture our whole lives.

Thankfully Reformed education can play a key role in helping build this literacy. Here at Harvest, we have the opportunity to spend time in God's Word every day and the opportunity to grow our language skills in language arts and in other classes. But for our children to really grow in literacy, the home needs to play a crucial role. So how do we as parents help our children grow in literacy? By having our children read books! Something happens to your mind and heart when you read a book. Nothing else does this. In a novel, you can contemplate characters, reflect on their actions, put yourself in their shoes. Good books allow us to think much deeper on a given topic in a way that nothing else can. Or as Dr. Seuss says: "The more your read, the more things you will know. The more that you learn, the more places you will go."

On that note, it also a blessing we not only get to read books in class, but we also have a library at Harvest. We have lots of great books for students to read and hopefully your children are taken

advantage of that. And as always if you have any book suggestions to further bolster our library, please share these suggestions with any librarians.



The mom has about 20 babies in her lifetime.


Penguins stay together all the time except for when they are getting fish for their babies.


